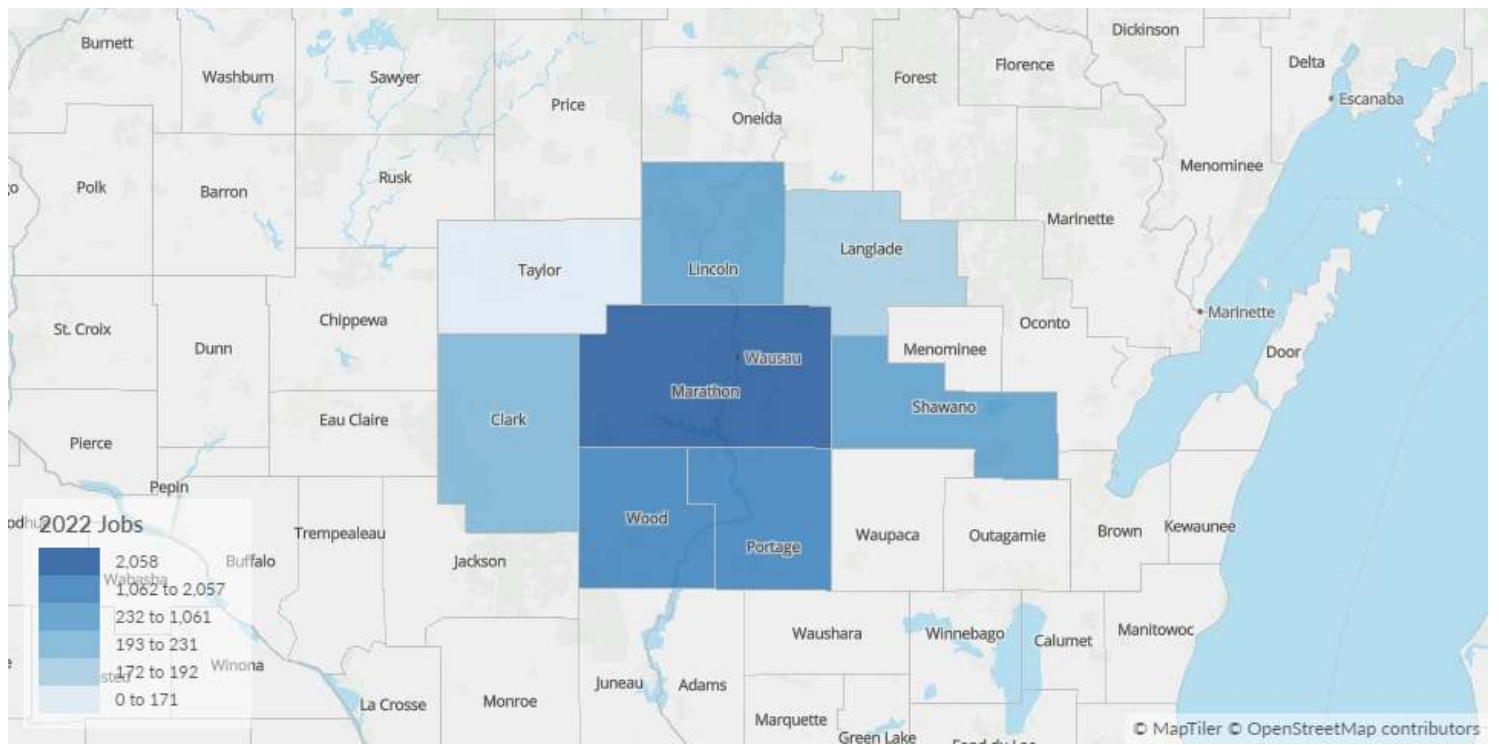

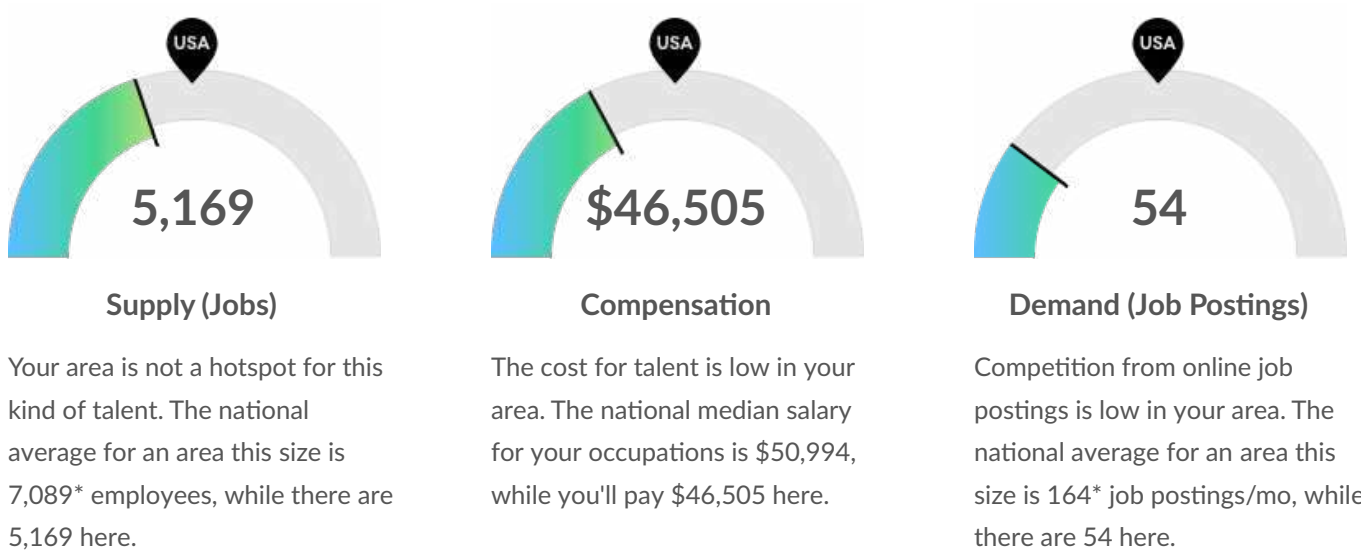

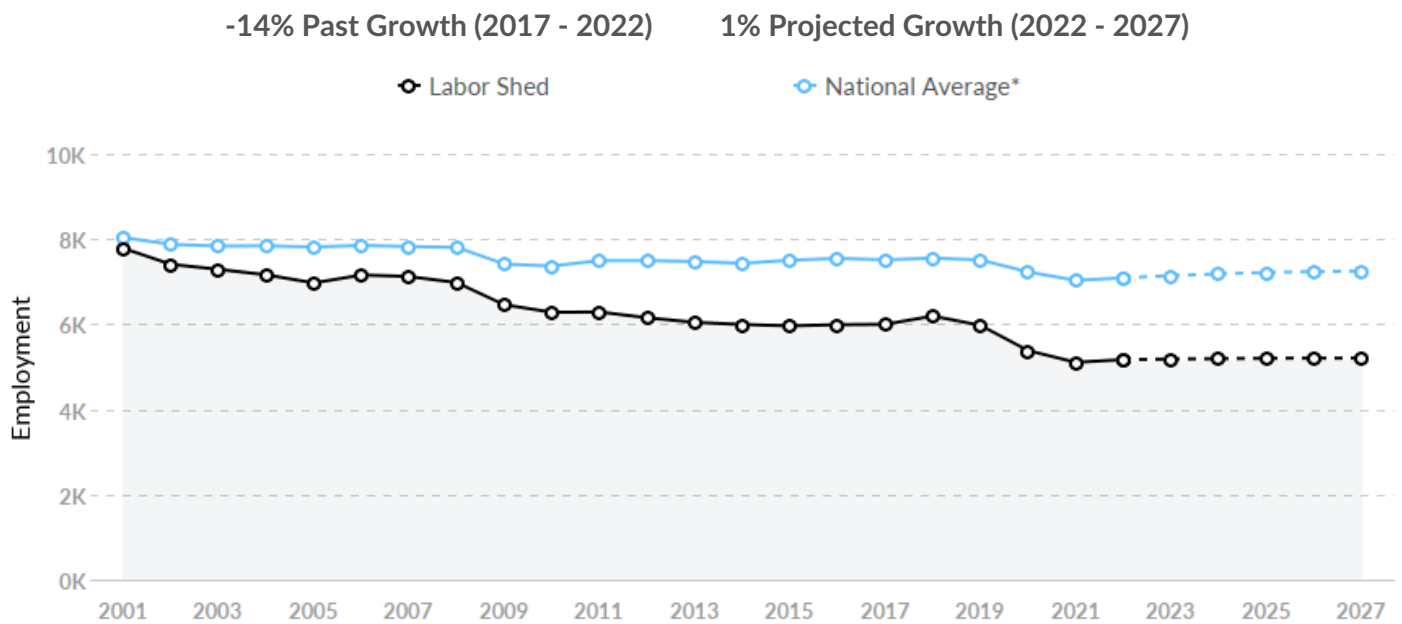

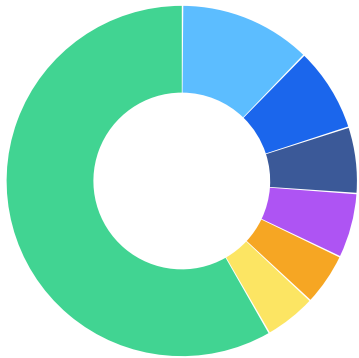
Supply Is Lower Than the National Average

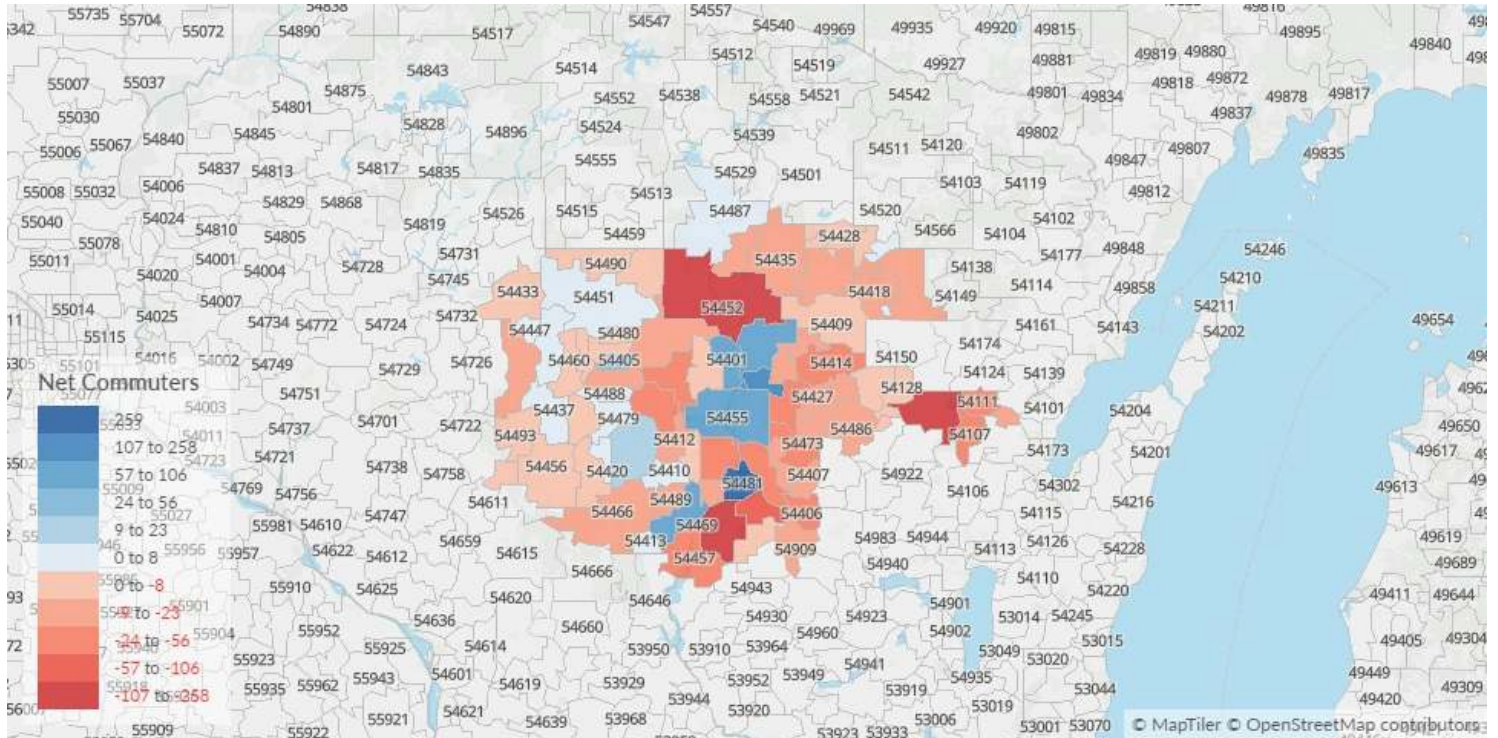

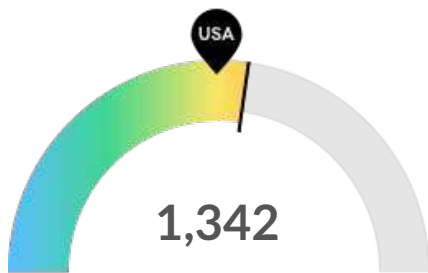

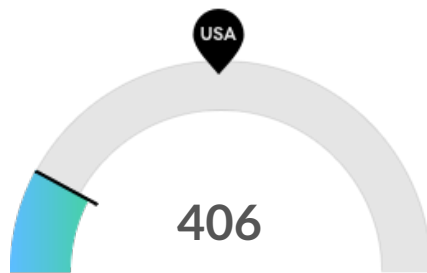

Retirement Risk Is High, While Overall Diversity Is Low



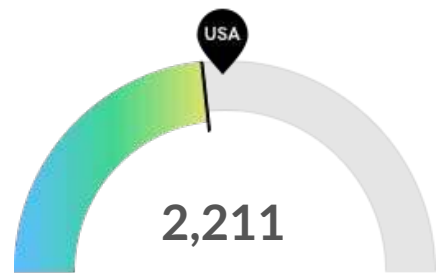
Retiring Soon

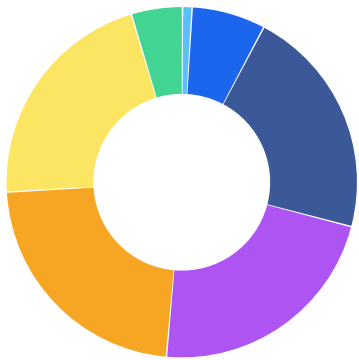
Gender Diversity

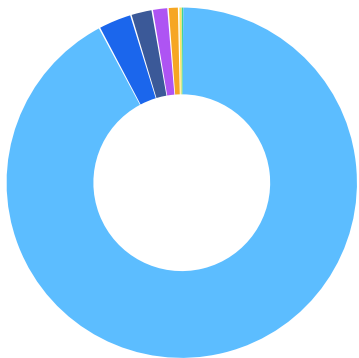

Occupation Gender Breakdown

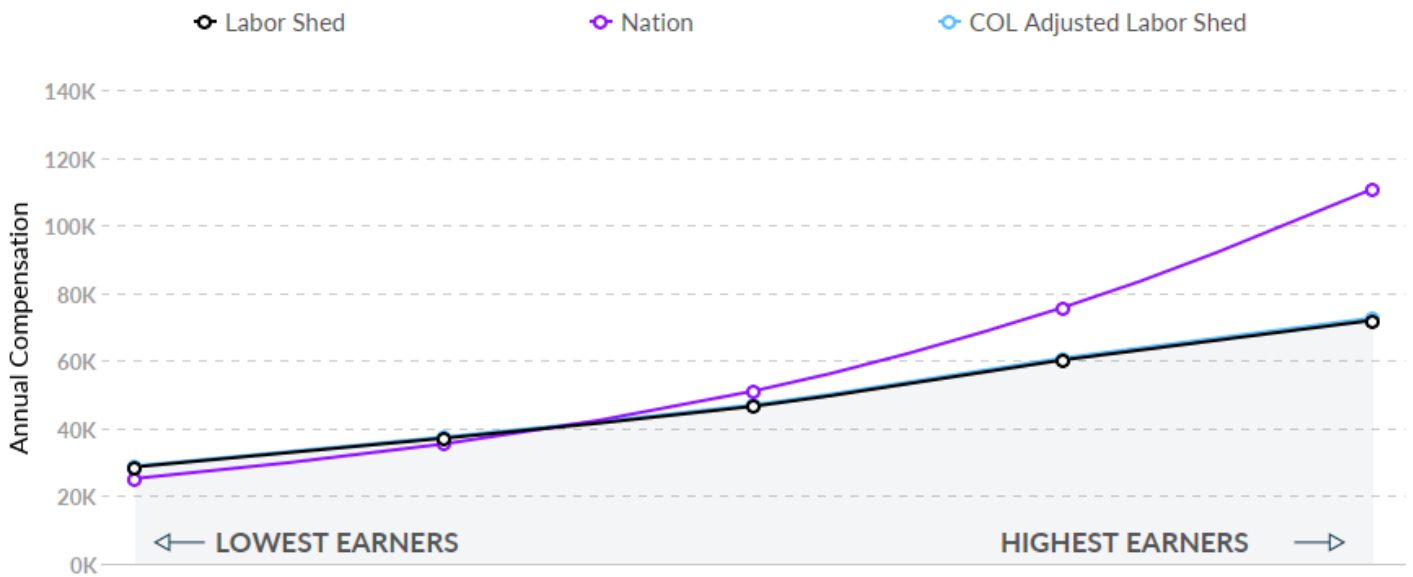

Compensation

Talent Is 9% Cheaper, While the Cost of Living May Make Attraction Difficult

In 2021, the median compensation for your occupations in your area is \$46,505. Based on the national median wage of \$50,994 for this position, this means you will spend about 9% less to employ your occupations here. However, their actual purchasing power will be 8% less than the national median when we adjust for regional cost of living (which is 1% lower than average). This may make it harder to attract talent to the region at this price.

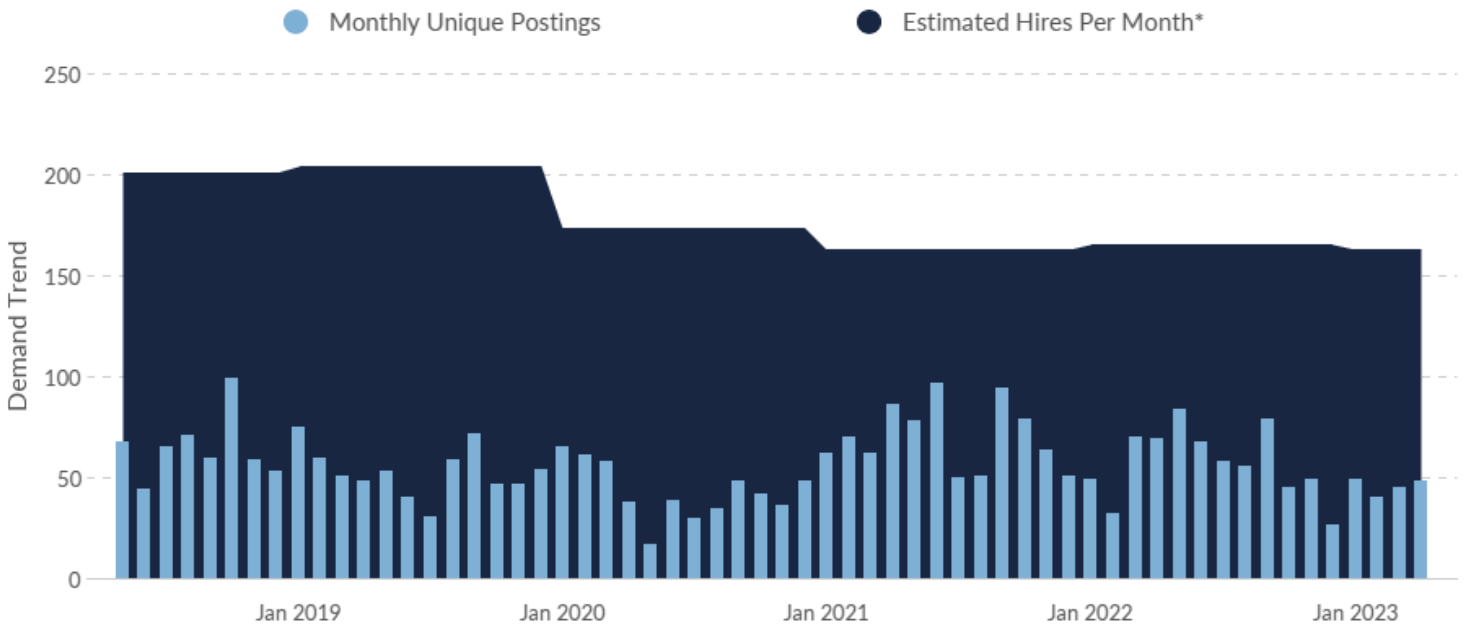

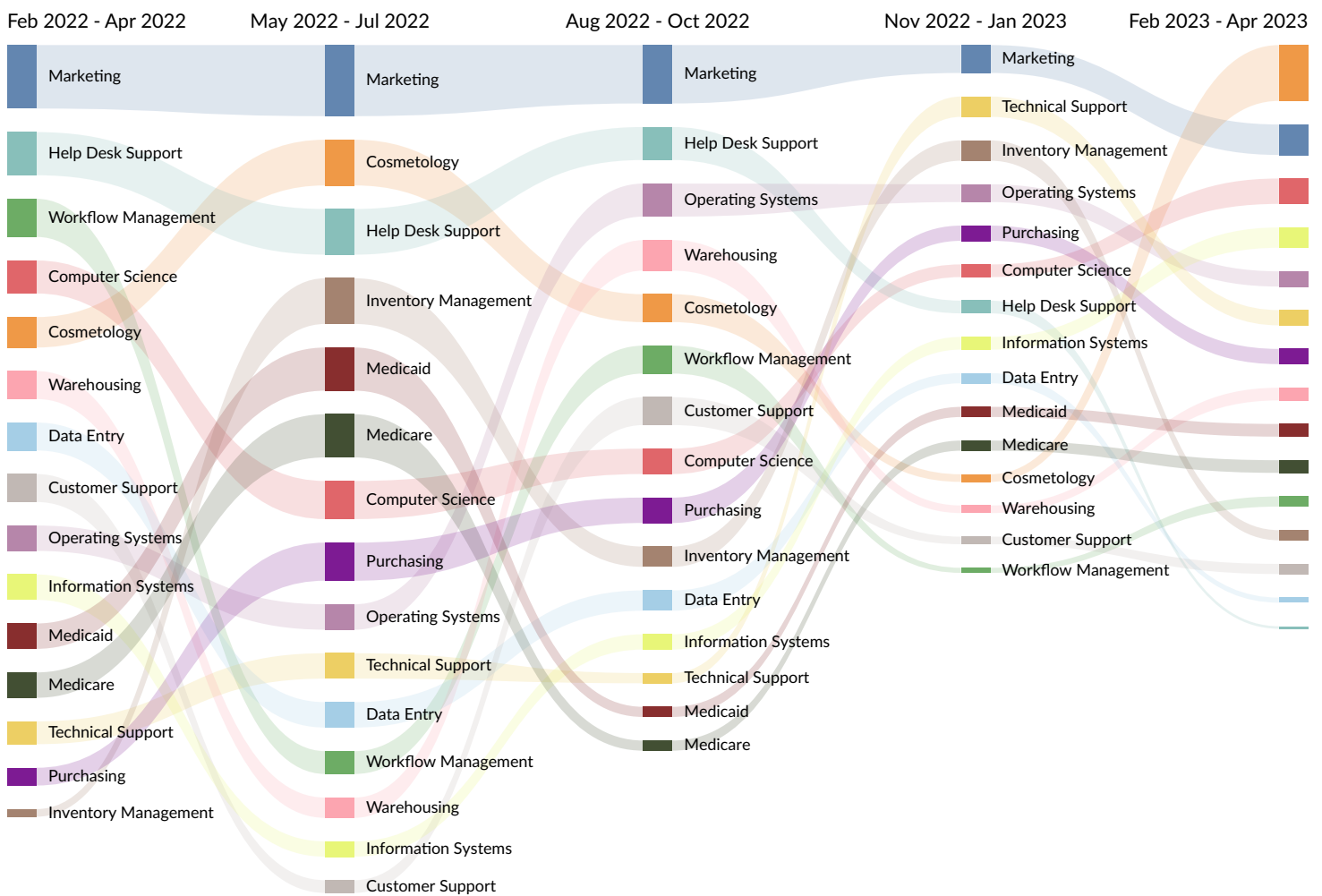

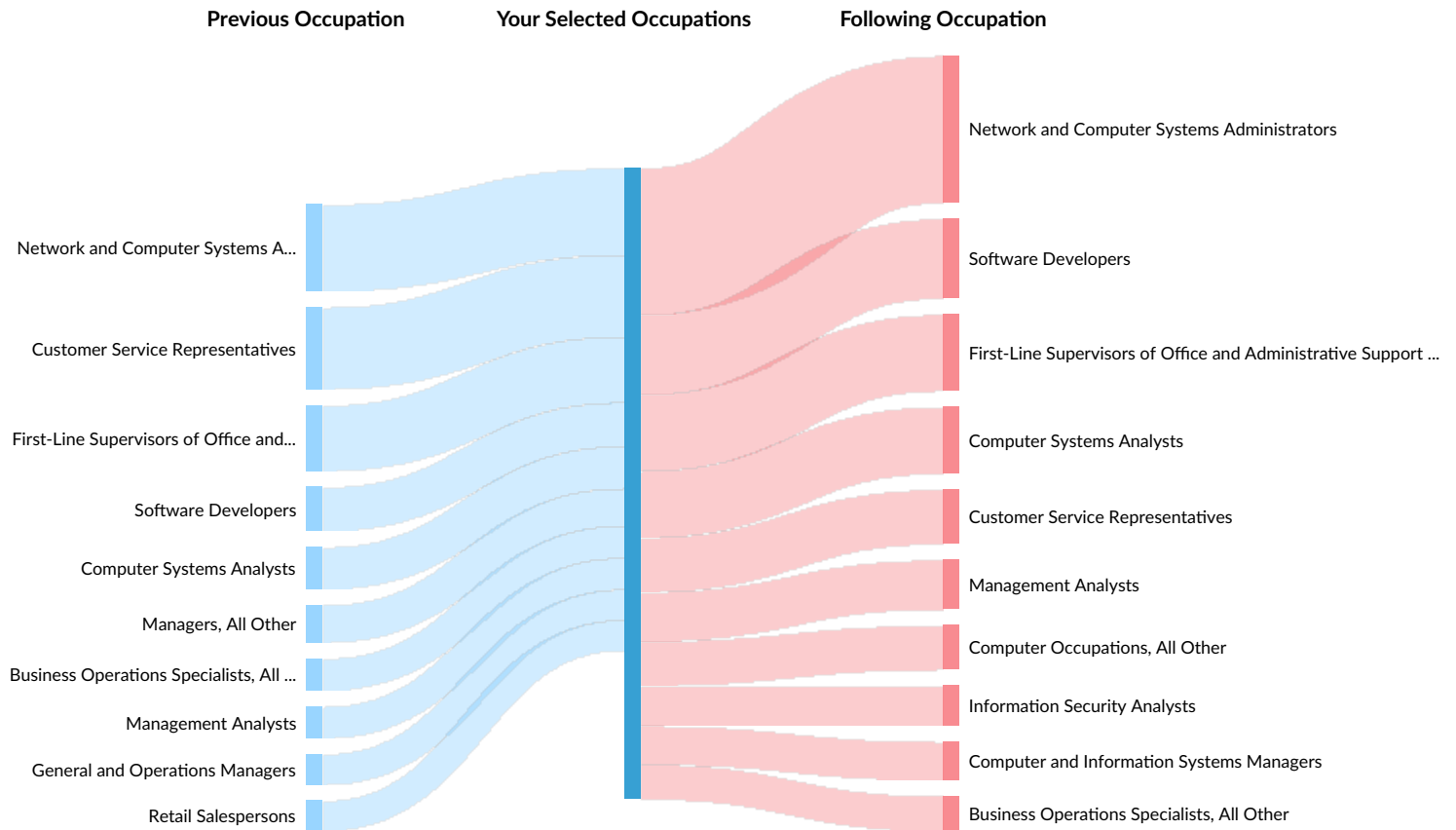
