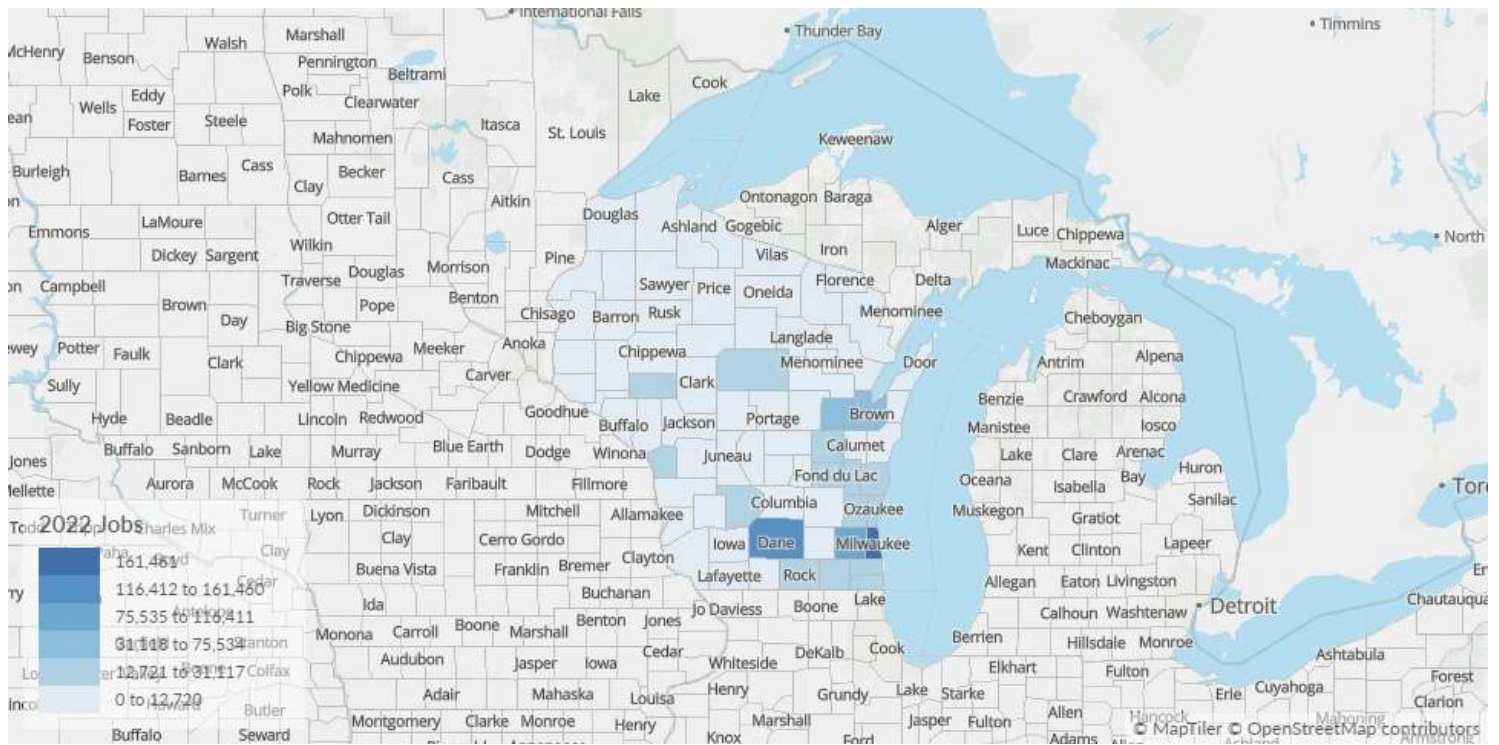

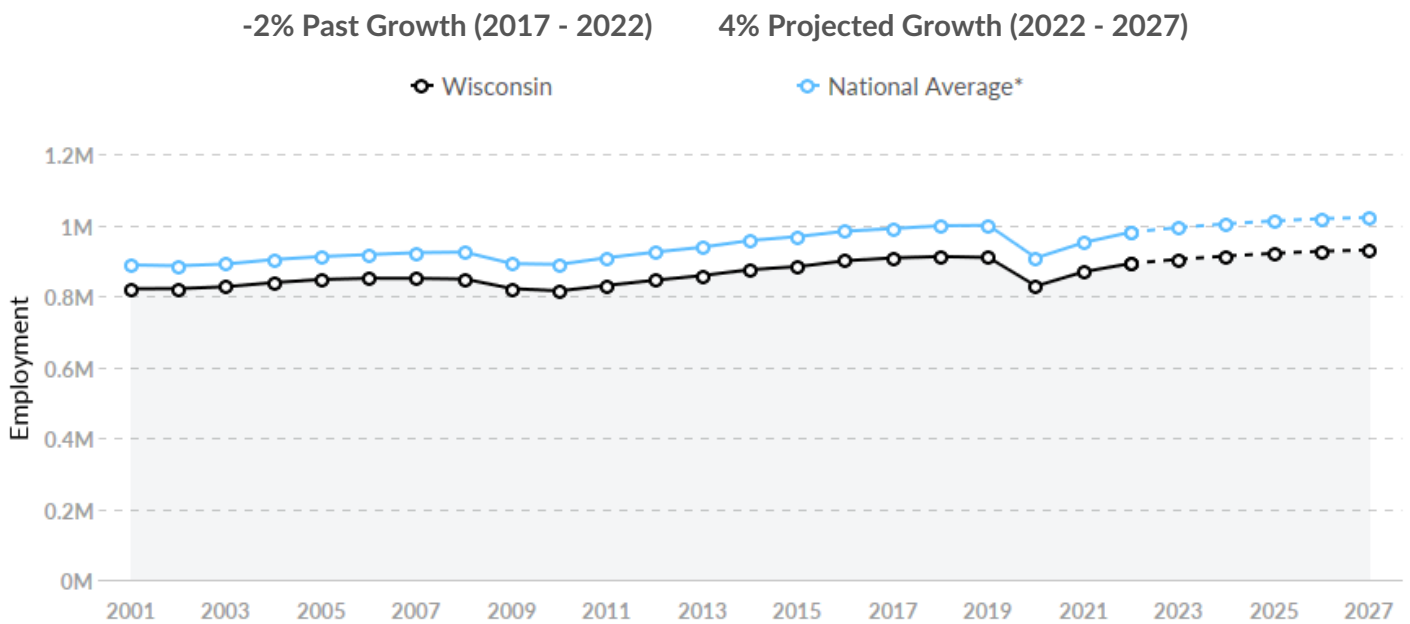

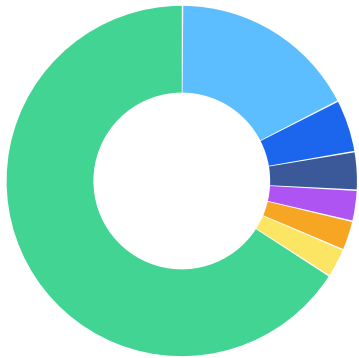
Supply Is About Equal to the National Average

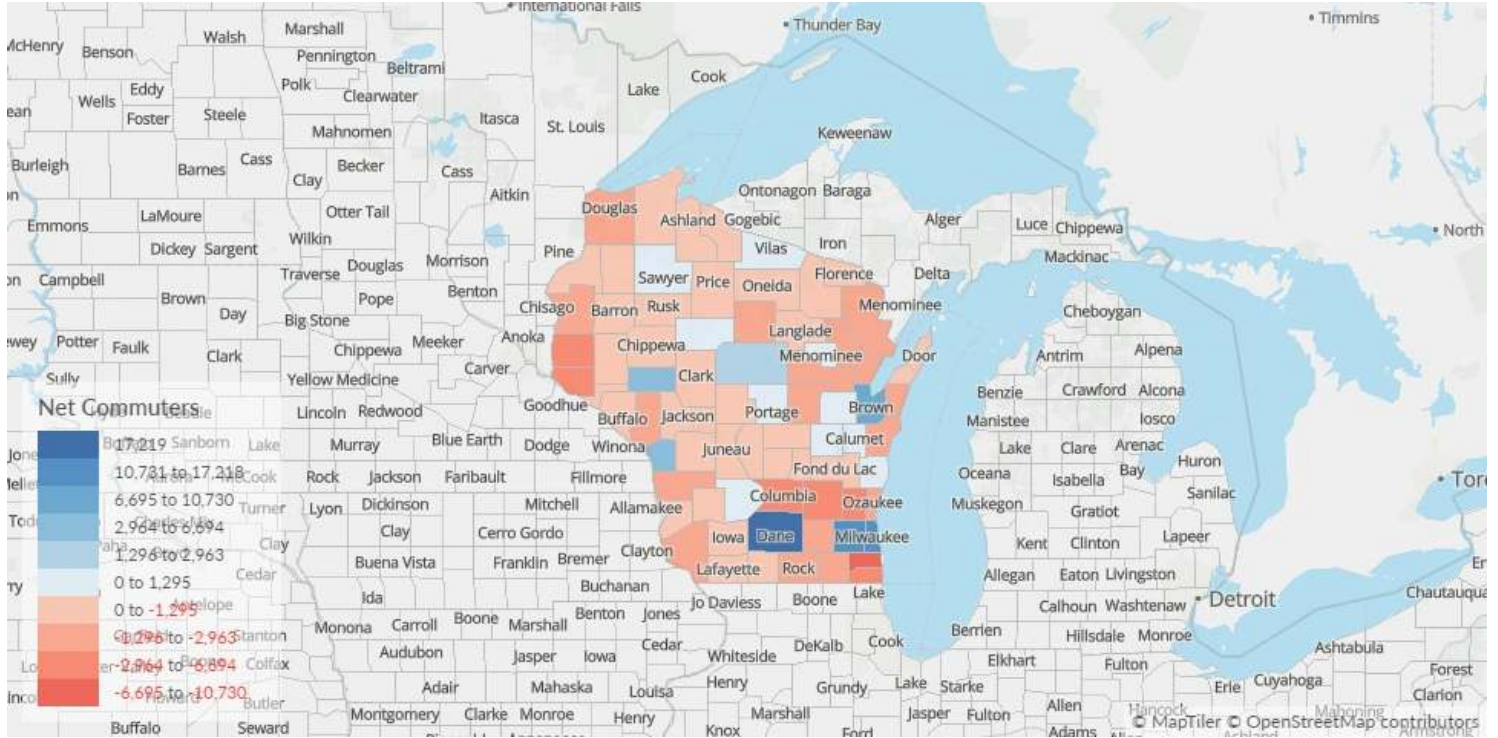

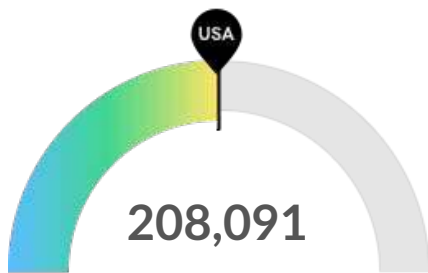

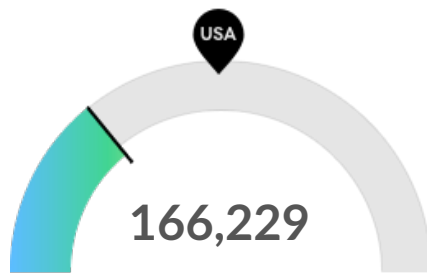

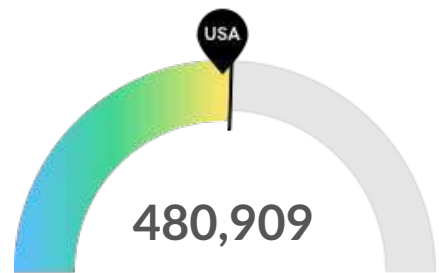

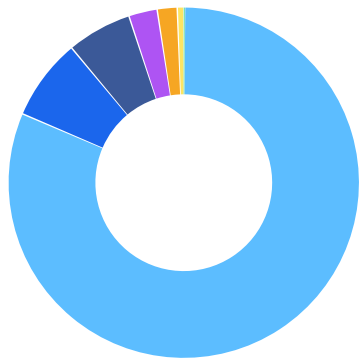

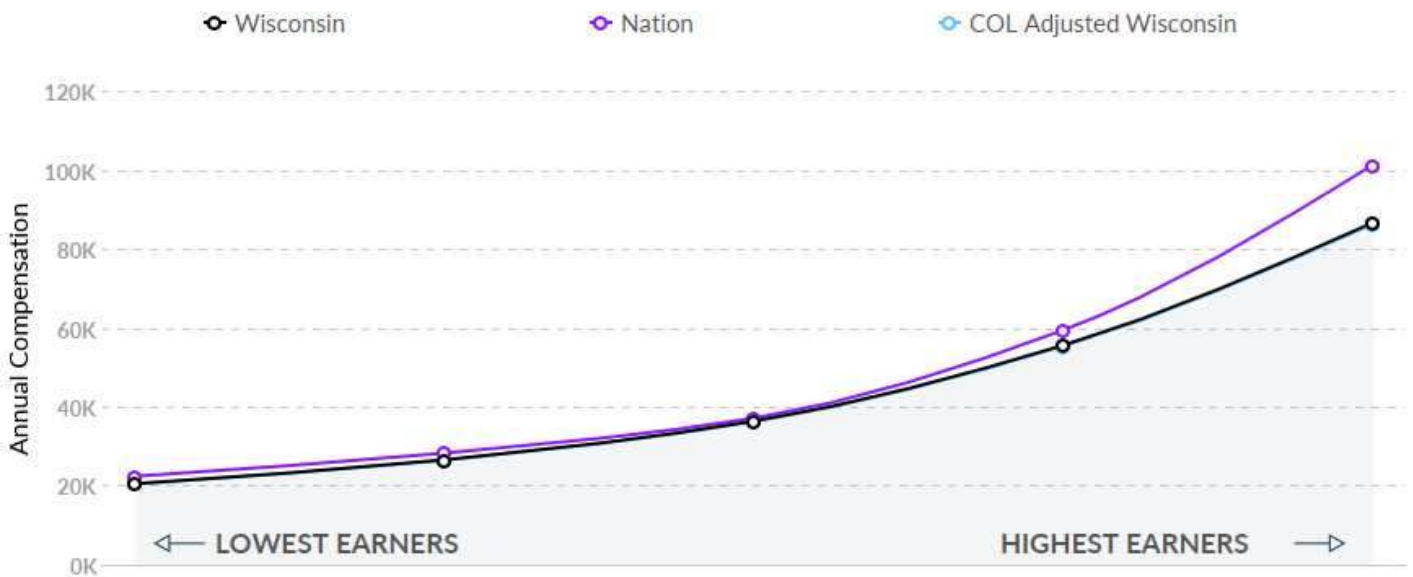

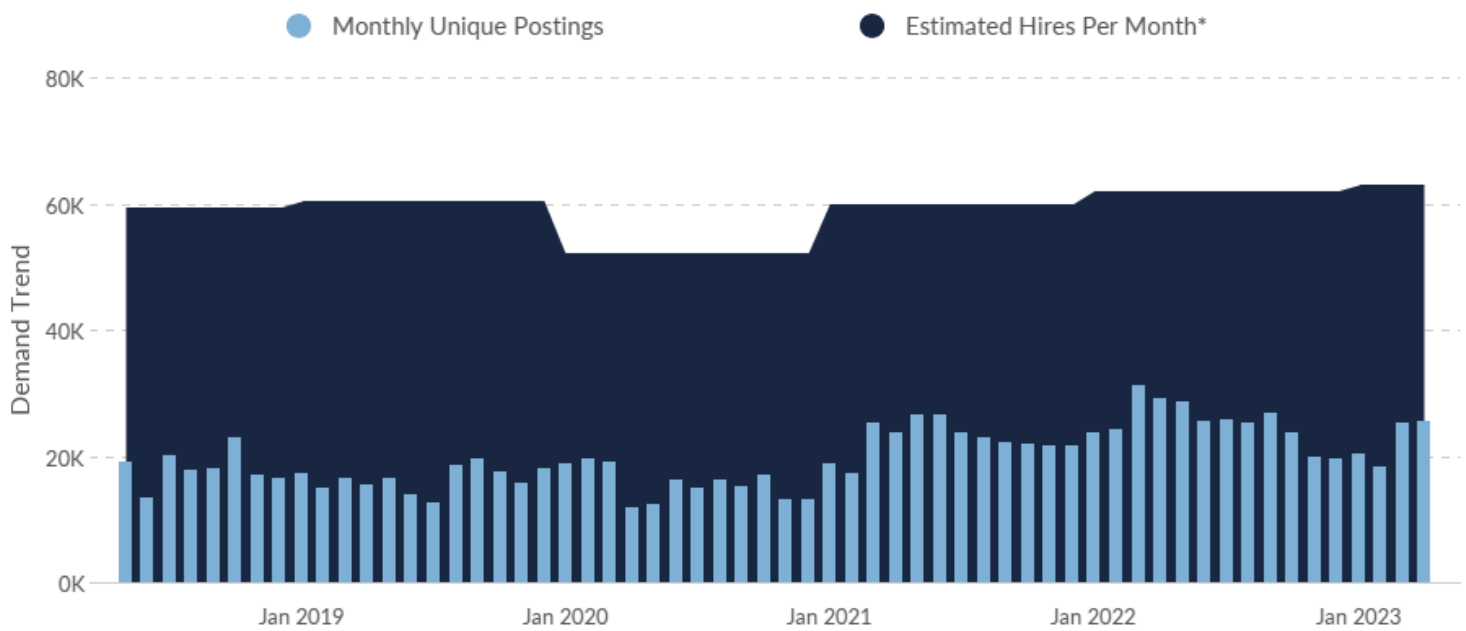

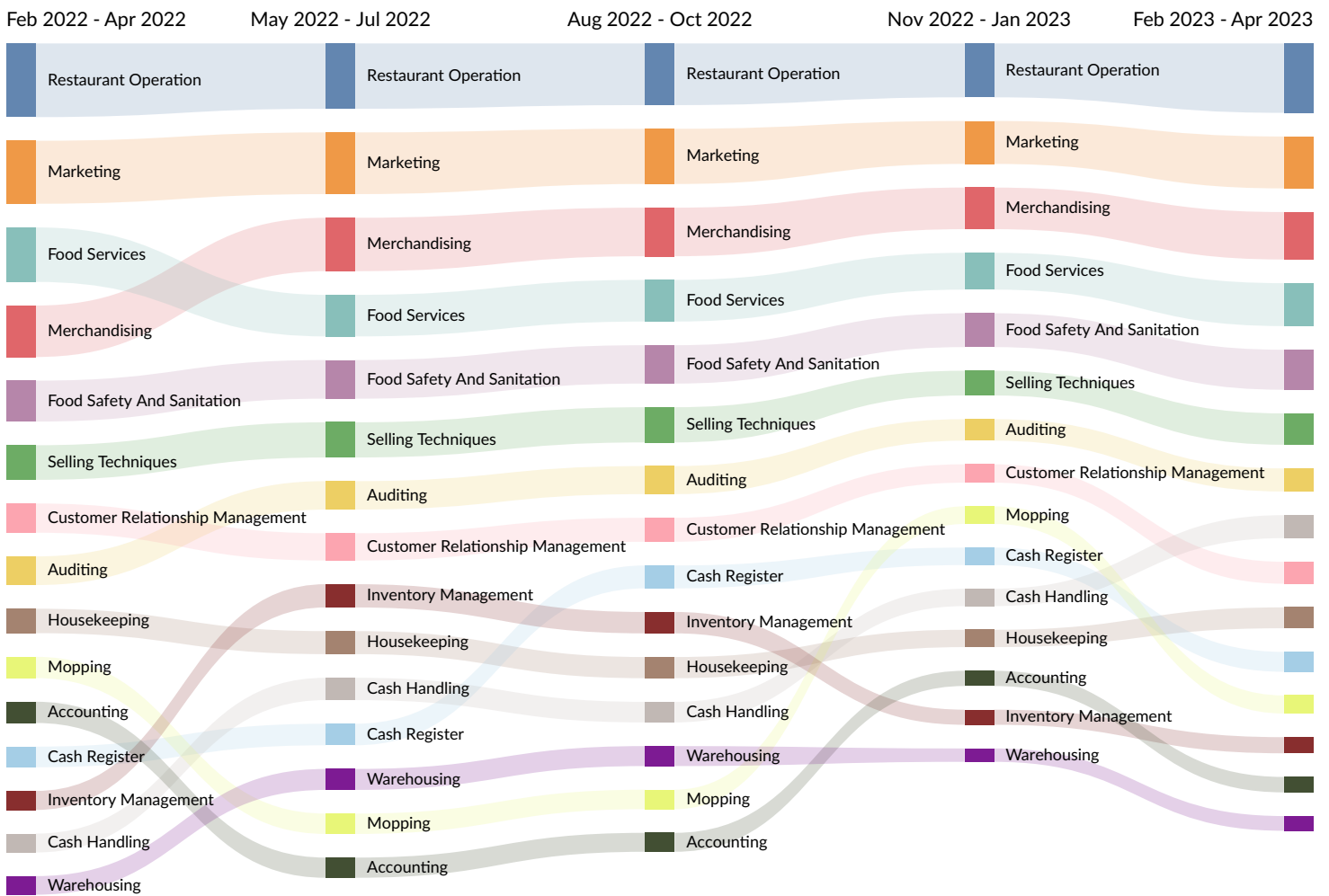

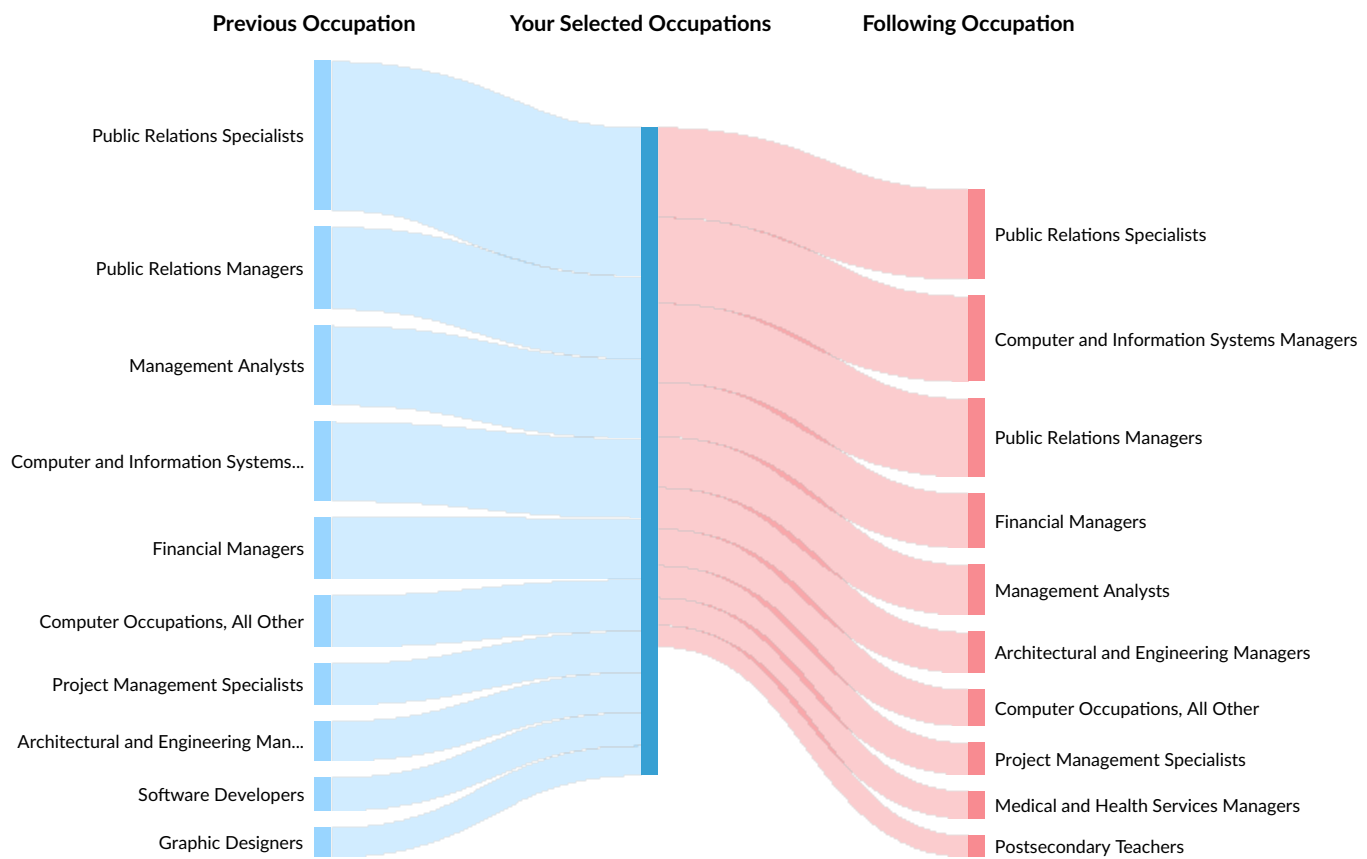
